Aloha TCVA members,

Beginning in September and again in March, TCVA will hold a Membership Drive to support our new \$35 annual dues. Painting of RADM Nora Tyson, Commander, Carrier Strike Group TWO

I joined the TACAMO community in the early 90's following a tour flying K/C-130'S (F/B models) in Rota Spain; among the group of officers that my wife, Sherry, and I initially became acquainted was VADM Nora Tyson and her husband Wayne. From our first meeting until retirement in 2018 our paths would cross regularly, to include a number of years as neighbors in OK.

In late 2011 when I was the Naval Attache assigned to the US Embassy, Paris France, I was contacted by SIXTH Fleet to see if a 4-day port call could be coordinated for CVN-77 (USS GHWB). In addition to a myriad of opportunities that a CVN port call presents to the US Ambassador and 'Country Team' I saw another opportunity with RADM Nora Tyson aboard as the first woman Commander of a Carrier Strike Group.

During one of my first trips to the French port city of Toulon I had met a US Navy Reserve Commander, Monica Allen Perin. CDR Perin was unlike any Naval Officer that I had met in that she had served a career as a Supply Officer and was now a Reserve Navy Artist attached to the Naval Historical Center.

Seeing an opening I called the then Commander of US SIXTH Fleet, VADM Harry Harris. The US Ambassador, Amb Charles Rivkin, had a personal request for Admiral Harris regarding the GHWB port pall, so when calling VADM Harris to relay this request I started giving a pitch; "Admiral, a former neighbor and leader from my community is the Commander of CSG-2. As the first women Commander of a Carrier Strike Group returning from combat operations in the Gulf, there is a unique opportunity to take advantage of your Reserve Navy Artist in Toulon". I got no farther, Admiral Harris cut my off and said that he loved the idea of capturing a portrait of RADM Tyson as Carrier Strike Group Commander and he would pull in Monica as she was just the person for such a portrait.

The steps to realize the painting happened more aggressively than even I imagined as Monica called me shortly thereafter saying that C6F had already contacted her and she wanted to know if I was flying out to GHWB with her to execute on the portrait. I was surprised at the level of support there was to Monica and her effort as I expected her to just walk aboard GHWB while in Port. A few years later at an event in Paris, I commented to ADM Harris about the effort to do the portrait of Admiral Tyson 'at sea'; he commented that he wanted an 'at sea' portrait as she was a Strike Group Commander. Admiral Harris turned Command of SIXTH Fleet over to VADM Frank Pandolfe shortly before GHWB arrived to Marseille.

My wife, Sherry, and I were fortunate to spend a few days with VADM Tyson in the South of France during the GHWB port call. Unfortunately, Wayne was not able to join during the port call.

Having seen the portrait many times in print, and in person in DC, the outcome appears to have been even greater than expected.

Monica Allen Perin, a painter from her youth, began her fine art studies at the California College of Arts and Crafts, Oakland, California. She subsequently obtained a Master's degree in the decorative arts (Museum Studies) at the Fashion Institute of Technology in Manhattan and consecrated her theses to the garden frescoes found in and around Pompeii.

Teaching art history with the University of Maryland she continued to teach studio art and paint watercolors of the Italian country and seaside.

Following a move with her French husband to the South of France in 1998 she expanded her repertoire to include 'buon fresco' painting on fresh lime plaster in the manner of the Renaissance, and is currently involved in an important project to add fresco work to the façade of the parish church in Le Pradet, France.

Monica is also a US Navy artist attached to the Naval Historical Center at the Washington Navy Yard, Washington D.C. As a 'combat' artist she has passed numerous weeks in ex-Yugoslavia and more recently with the Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean documenting daily life in an operational capacity onboard an aircraft carrier or logistics support with a forward deployed unit. Monica has exhibited her watercolors in Italy, the US and in France, in particular in Marseille, Toulon (awarded best in show for watercolors at the Salon des beaux-arts 2002), and most recently in Cannes where she was awarded the silver medal at the salon international des arts and culture.

The Merc Just Keeps Going, 33 Years and Counting



The TACAMO Program Office recently celebrated the 33rd anniversary of the first operational E-6A Mercury jets arriving at VQ-4 to begin fleet service. There's a lot not said in that simple story. For those of us who have lived with the Merc all these years, we might pause a remember more.

Older Than Our Hercs

While our Hercs were built and delivered over a period of 25 years from oldest 151 series to final 161 series, the Mercs were built and delivered over just 4 years. The longest working Hercs performed 25 years in the Fleet while the shortest working ones only 10 years. Several of those 'younger' Hercs went on to second careers with NASA, Royal Netherlands Air Force, and Coulson Air Tankers, those as firebombers. While the Hercs delivered on over 25,000 flight hours and amost that many landings, the Mercs have surpassed those numbers but over 33 years. That is like asking an NFL player to get out there and scramble and take hits well past their prime. And the whole Merc 'team' pretty much started playing in the same first seasons.

Identity Crisis and Other Problems

From the very start the name was not certain: TACAMO II, ECX, Hermes, and finally Mercury. The latter were appropriate 'messengers of the gods' in mythology, Greek and then Roman. Designed as a digital flight deck, that got axed and installed almost 20 years later. There were tail losses in some very demanding flight tests, causing delays therefore in delivery to the Fleet, trunnion cracks, three wire installation and later removal, later still counterfeit parts, bad paint, and depot maintenance miscues. But the Merc served through all of that, even airborne and doing the mission on 9-11, pulling a brief side hustle in support of convoys in Iraq, and a lot of global exercises, round the world flight, and long flights.

Continual Improvements

The Mercs have all stayed in service and underewent as many mission upgrades as the Hercs. Orbit Improvement System, glass cockpit, early airborne Internet access, Airborne Command Post, bandwidth extension, radio system upgrades, computer and data upgrades, and additional satellite systems. But all those upgrades didn't give the Merc a true rehab. A service life assessment and extension program were done and the jets have undergone heavy depot maintenance. Still, they are flying with the same wings, engines, power, cooling, and creature comforts developed in the 80s and delivered late in that decade and early 90s. The Merc 'team', smaller than the Herc 'team' by about one-third, played every season, every game, every year for the past 33 years. All experienced some 'bench time' for mods and maintenance and that meant the others had to cover 'the field' when they were out of service.



League and Management Changes

Initially, the Mercs had one solid job and they did it well. But in their first decade, their excellent great reputation created a vulnerability. The Air Force got a hint that the new team could start playing in their league and give their like birds retirements. And so after 98, Mercs started playing in TWO leagues, out there in the Navy's and Air Force/Joint Service Leagues. Pretty much, that drove a bunch of new gear, new 'plays', and new people getting aboard and getting involved in controlling the demands placed on the 'team' and supporting it. That made life far more complicated for the Mercs and the crews flying, maintaining, and supporting them. It was far more straightforward in the 'old TACAMO' days. Still, through it all, the Mercs and their people DELIVERED.

How Does It Feel?

The Mercs, like the veteran NFL players, are feelin' it, Man! The body has aches and pains, and cracks, leaks and stuff just wearing out. You hit the field for that long and that many times, literally, it's gonna hurt. Paint, upholstery, wiring, tubing, and the subsystems all are feeling their age. So, the Navy Program Office folks continually evaluate those things and listen to the Fleet to determine what 'hurts' the most. The pain level is shared with senior leaders trying to help. Priorities are set, funding is moved around, and contracts are being awarded. New technologies are being applied, and new folks are building old parts. *Continued on Page 11*

What's Next?

It's no secret that the Merc team is going to be retired. But that's not anytime soon. That fact drives the folks in a lot of places to keep working to help them keep playing. The Super Hercs look like the new team, but it takes development, testing and suitability work before they can hit the field and start playing as an effective team. Some positive factors in this deal include a change of league and some proven experience. Senior leaders are requiring the Mercs to keep playing in both leagues but grooming the new Hercs to play only in the Navy's league. Still all that takes time, money, support in national circles, and crew maintainer training. It is a big job and it is underway. Those of us who operated the TACAMO Herc KNOW in our souls that the Herc can do the job. People who have that experience are sharing gouge with folks trying to develop and field the new Hercs. Several folks have asked me about a Merc museum aircraft and I just look at the sky and tell them I don't know when or if that will happen. Keeping such a soon-to-be dinosaur in presentable shape is a problem, not to mention that Mercs MUST keep on playing until relieved. Maybe it is time to start collecting our pennies, holding bake sales, and car washes to fund putting a Merc at Tinker alongside the Herc. CERTAINLY, the Mercs have earned a place of honor like that.



Notes on Nuclear War: The First of Us






By James Youngblood, TACAMO active duty member & TCVA historian assistant Have any of you ever sat and thought of our place in defense of this nation? We hold a unique duty as the first line of deterrence and the last line of defense. This is a solemn responsibility that we have held for decades, but I have recently wondered who was the first of our kind? We all know that the TACAMO community was created in the 1960s, however, like the civilizations of today, what foundation does the Navy build its airborne nuclear heritage upon? It was with this question I began my journey of research on the topic. My findings were both interesting and unexpected. In a small plot in Arlington National Cemetery, you will find a headstone marked for Rear Admiral William Sterling Parsons. Though history may have forgotten him, it is my assertion that this man was the first "Atomic Aircrewman".

Born in Chicago in 1901, he was the oldest of three children. He graduated from high school in 1919 and received an appointment to the US Naval Academy. He graduated 48th in his class, ahead of another legend of naval service Hyman Rickover. It was while attending Annapolis he received his nickname "Deak". He was commissioned as an Ensign and stationed aboard the USS Idaho (a ship that my grandfather would serve on during World War II) as a gunnery officer. This is where he found his calling. He quickly became enamored with gunnery and ordnance. The decision to follow this line of work would put the then Ensign Parsons on a collision course with history. The following years would see "Deak" take assignments with various ships, the Bureau of Ordnance, and the Naval Research Laboratory where he was instrumental in the development of proximity fuses for aerial ordnance. His reputation made him an obvious choice when General Leslie Groves, head of the Top Secret Manhattan Project, was looking for an expert to help develop the first nuclear weapons. By then, Captain Parsons was assigned to Los Alamos as the Associate Director of Project Y. This position placed him as number two in the chain, under only Dr. Oppenhiemer himself. Parsons took to work developing the trigger mechanism for the weapon, a duty that he was uniquely qualified to do. He was present at the test of "The Gadget" in July of 1945, observing it from the sky in a B-29. He would again find himself assigned to an aircrew a few weeks later on August 6th, 1945. On that day he was a "Technical Mission Observer" and defacto Mission Commander of the Enola Gay. When the specially designed "silverplate" B-29 made it to the target area, Captain Parsons made his way to the bomb bay where he carefully armed the weapon known as "Little Boy". At approximately 0816, he ordered the release of the weapon. Forty-five seconds later, the face of the world would be changed forever. With the release of that bomb and its

companion "Fat Man", Captain Parsons had effectively ended World War II and started the political and economic conflict that was the Cold War. Upon his return he was awarded a Silver Star and assigned to various "special weapons" commands, including Commander, Task Group 1.1. There he would plan and execute many atomic weapons tests like Operations Crossroads. He would continue his service after the war leading the American development of nuclear weapons technology, eventually being promoted Rear Admiral and placed in charge of the Bureau of Ordnance. He passed suddenly on December 5th, 1953, in Bethesda Naval Hospital.

RDML Parsons was, by my approximation, the first in a long line of "Atomic Aircrewmen". While this is a rather unorthodox choice, he undoubtedly has had an unseen influence in the way of the world since he pressed the button while airborne over Japan. His actions led to the creation of bigger weapons, which led to the need to secure them aboard submarines, which led to a need to communicate the Presidential orders, which led to us. This journey of discovery has led me to realize that our way of life is built on the shoulders of the past. Thank you for joining me on this journey and I look forward to learning with you next time.



50th Anniversary

VQ-4 Bermuda Detachment Looking Back 50 Years



The TACAMO Program was in its early formative stage during the period of 1974/1975. There had been few substantive changes made to the aircraft systems, and some movement in personnel qualifications, until, the decision to implement the much more powerful TACAMO IVB ("TACAMO Four B") (T-IVB) very low frequency transmitter program. The most intriguing and puzzling issue is that even after the conversion program was decided upon, there was the lack of confirmation as to what existing NAVY program or research program would be chosen as the survivable communication link to the SSBN launch




capabilities. In addition, there was always the speculation that **By Bill Coyne**, USN Retired Captain & VQ-4 MO & CO, TACAMO would become an Air Force program.


Add now the decision to stand-down the TACAMO III ("TACAMO Three") (T-III) program from 100% airborne coverage, Naval Flight Officers in the Airborne Communications Officer positions were made eligible for Mission Commander designation, (in my estimation a significant step in the success of the TACAMO Mission), VQ-4 was placed under the administrative command of Fleet Tactical Support Wing One, and rumors that efforts were ongoing to designate TACAMO a Warfare Specialty Program, In my opinion, the most important decision ever made in the TACAMO program. These events can all be grouped into two words, "change apprehension" one of the most difficult personnel issues to address. Now transition to the T-IVB system begins with the mindset already dealing with these changes to be compounded with even more.

In the way of background, TACAMO made a significant advancement into the league of creditable strategic deterrents with the introduction of the T-IVB modified C-130. Coincidentally, it became evident that the ability to launch the ready alert aircraft from PAX River in one hour as had been with the T-III aircraft was outmoded. The launch time was always the hallmark of the 100% airborne goal but it was predicated on relieving the PLE aircraft to allow it to land with safe options. During the period of T-III changes occurred which calls into question the reasonableness of continuing this mode of operation. A few examples, but not inclusive: the previous one hour requirement did not allow for the population growth in the Lexington Park area, the two lane highway, lack of good housing outside of the immediate Base area, communication issues with landline phones etc. and the crowed air corridors on the East Coast. Its greatest weakness however, was failure to address the increased presence of adversary submarines and trawlers off the Atlantic Coast, the improvements in the adversary's Cruise Missile capability and even more critical, the need to get as many TACAMO aircraft in the air under certain Defense Condition (DEFCON) conditions. My point was we failed to understand the Ready Alert as a survival entity as well as the revered 100% airborne philosophy.

Accordingly, VQ-4 petitioned the Atlantic Fleet Commander (CINCFLANTFLT) to permit the Ready Alert Aircraft to be stationed in Bermuda. In addition, the aircraft and crew would be subjec. In addition, the aircraft and crew would be subject to a fifteen minute launch window, which allow the... *Continued on Page 14*

aircraft to be safely launched and out of Cruise Missile range. Multiple unannounced drill alerts were made with the ready alert aircraft in Bermuda, proving the concept to be valid.

This step forward for TACAMO placed it in the realm of alert status similar to the early Strategic Air Command, the US Navy Maritime Patrol (VP) ready alert status which required the whole crew to reside on base during their duty status, and I believe the USAF Airborne Command Post (ABNCP) at that time.

Many other important considerations were embedded in the final decision to establish the Bermuda Detachment. The final stages of the transition to the T-IVB aircraft and all crews qualified created challenging scheduling conditions because of mismatched aircraft and crews as well as the necessity to train VQ-3 crews in a timely fashion to meet their incoming T-IVB aircraft, hence, the mid-deployment stand down was a luxury we could not afford.

Of equal importance to the above, was the drain on crews where it related to downtime at PAX River. Training, Deployments, Ready Alerts, and Standby Alerts. I believed there was a better solution to the problem than "continue as before". Being able to stand the Ready Alert as part of the deployment package meant at least one more uncommitted day at home each cycle.

Secondly, and of great value to the mission, was the fact that the deploying crew flew the first operational leg to Bermuda which allowed them to hone their equipment skills, strengthen their teamwork, and mentally focus on the coming deployment. It also allowed them to stay with their assigned aircraft for the whole deployment. Also in the event of any aircraft malfunctions, they could return to home base or land in Bermuda a few hours away from help. In one instance, an engine failed during pre-flight in Bermuda and within 3.5 hours a substitute deployment aircraft was delivered to the crew to continue their watch and deployment. The crew's original aircraft was flown back to PAX River for repair.

The Bermuda Detachment decision was not immune to apprehensions. My approach to the issues presented to me was to educate everyone on the reasoning behind it, and most of all prove to the best of my ability the benefits of the approach we were taking. If we learned anything from the reaction of the Squadron members regarding these decisions it was the ability to package the changes so that everything we knew needed to be done was affected in the package to avoid later piecemeal changes and further apprehensions. Perhaps we will be better prepared for the major changes during the E-6 stand-down and C-130 coming online.

The fact that the Bermuda Detachment system was successful until stand-down with the E-6 Mercury introduction, merits consideration that it was the correct assessment to enhance TACAMO Atlantic (TACAMOLANT) survivability during this period.

Bill's leadership and his wisdom in placing people in positions of responsibility, enabled his plans and the squadron to succeed.

You're sitting in the bleachers, watching your favorite softball team when suddenly the guys next to you respond to the crackling of a walkie talkie and dash to a gray Navy van. The excitement is followed by flashing the beacons of two other vehicles. They drive around the end of the runway, and stop at the EC-130 aircraft parked just off the runway on the south end of the field. With a flurry of activity, people jump out of the vehicles, check with the Marine sentry and run to the plane. One engine is started immediately and the other three are started simultaneously. The plane taxies to the end of the runway, pauses for a moment, starts its take-off roll and soon disapperas as it climbs over the hills. All this has transpired over a very brief period of time.

Very brief period of time. You have just seen a "ready alert" launch by TACAMO (Take charge and move out) EC-130 from the Fleet Air Reconnaisance Squadron four (VQ-4) homebased at NAS/NATC Patuxent River, Maryland. VQ-4 is one of two Navy strategic communications squadrons. The other is VQ-3 which is homeported in Barber's Point, Hawaii.

VQ-4's mission (TACAMOLANT) is to maintain continuous airborne coverage around the North Atlantic Basin as a survivable communications command and control relay platform between commander-in-Chief, Atlantic (CINCLANT) and his deployed forces. It is under the direct operational control of CINCLANT, Norfolk, Virginia. The squadron operated specially equipped EC-130 Hercules aircraft on independent two week deployments.

VQ-4 maintains a permanent maintenance and communications detachment that rotates its personnel every two months between Pax River and NAS Bermuda. The officer-in-charge of the Bermuda detachment is a two week rotating billet filled by officers from the squadron's homebase.

The critical timing of the alert requires crews to remain together at all times with immediate access to transportation. Two vehicles are assigned to the VQ-4 Bermuda det for transporting the crews to the aircraft for launches, to the Commissary for groceries (long flight hours mean inflight meals), to the clubs for meals and the gymnasium for a physical break in tense routine. Due to the length of the alert cycle, the crews are authorized to use the vehicles to support these functions, to provide some release from the confines of their quarters, yet still enabling them to respond to a launch immediately and become airborne with efficiency.

So, when you see a gray Navy van with yellow TACAMO ready alert license plates at the Commissary store, it's probably a VQ-4 alert crew picking up groceries, yet with the crackling from their walkie talkie, they're just minutes away from "wheels in the wells".



With a Little Help From His Friends

NORFOLK — During his address to the annual Retention Conference held here in September, Adm. Isaac C. Kidd, Commander-in-Chief, U.S. Atlantic Fleet, stressed the Atlantic Fleet theme of mak-ing "a turn inward" to solve its own prob-leme.

ing "a turn inward" to solve its own prob-lems. "In our efforts to meet this challenge," he said, "let us be guided by the answers to two questions: What have I done for the Fleet today? and What have I done for a shipmate today?" The spirit of helping ourselves by helping each other, as expressed by the admiral, has new meaning for the 600 officers and men of Fleet Air Reconnaisance Squadron 4 as the result of their experiences with an injured member of that squadron during August and September of last year. It all began at about 9 p.m. on Aug. 11, 1975, at NAS Bermuda while one of VQ-4's EC-130 aircraft was taxing toward a park-ing spot near the squadron's detachment hangar.

Ing spot near the squadron's detachment hangar. The line vehicle, which had been dis-patched to assist the taxiing aircraft, dart-ed between two EC-130's parked on the line. Near the nose of one of these parked air-craft, four VQ-4 flight crewmembers were awaiting transportation to their quarters. In the darkness, the line craft driver did not see them in time. One man escaped the path of the skidding truck, but three others were not so fortunate. I.4. (9g) Jim Scott and Aviation Electron-tes Technician Third Peter Kohlberger took glancing blows and were rolled backwards in opposite directions. Aviation Electron-tes Technician First Luke Smith was hit head-on by the truck and sustained grave in-juries.

juries. Maintenance Detachment Chief Alton Hope went to the aid of Smith and attempted to stop the profuse bleeding from his face. Hope's actions probably saved

Smith's life. Ens. Jim Klepper, a former Navy corpsman, was on board the taxiing aircraft, and he and Lt. (jg) Herb Hess rushed to the scene to administer first aid to Scott and Kohlberger, who were both in a state of shock.

state of shock. WITHIN A matter of minutes, an ambu-lance was on the scene and Navy corpsmen administered first aid while rushing Smith to the NAS Bermuda dispensary. Off-duty dispensary personnel came in to help when they heard of the accident. The original prognosis was bleak. Smith was semi-comatose with multiple fractures of the skull, face, ribs and leg, the was later taken to the best equipped medical facility available — King Edward Memorial Hospi-tal in Hamilton, Bermuda. The other two injured men were in better condition and remained at the dispensary for treatment

serts. On August 14, Scott and Kohlberger were transferred to the National Naval Medical Center in Bethesda, Md. Scott suffered abrasions, contusions and knee injuries. Kohlberger sustained back injuries consist-ing of several cracked vertebrae. After treatment at Bethesda and NAS Patuxent River (Md.) Hospital, they were released and soon were back on the job.

And soon were back on the job. SMITH WAS TO recover slowly, how-ever. After extended periods of heavy seda-tion for pain, respirator-assisted breathing and several resettings of his broken bones, he returned to full consciousness. Smith continued to make progress, and on September 10, he and his wile boarded an Air Force C-141 for a Medevac flight to the National Naval Medical Center in Be-thesda. After about 2½ weeks of treatment and tests, Luke was transferred to Patux-ent River and continued treatment as an out-patient at the Naval hospital there. Smith was welcomed back to VQ-4 on October 28 when he and Linda attended ceremonies conducted in celebration of the Navy's Bicentennial birthday. His return was the highlight of the day's activities. Even though he was on convalescent leave, the Smiths returned to the squadron on November 14, when they attended a spe-cial ceremony honoring their neighbors – the Wolfords. The Wolfords were presented a VQ-4 plaque and a letter of commenda-tion making them honorary VQ-4 "Shadows."

"Shadows," In his address on the occasion, Cmdr. Laurel C. Peterson, commanding officer of VQ-4, said none of the ceremonies honoring the Navy's birthday could better capture the essence of the Bicentennial theme "building on a proud tradition" than the actions of the Wolfords on behalf of the Smith family.



Letter from Chief Russell's Son TACAMO Family...



Dear TACAMO Community,

This year was the 47 year of the remembrance of Crew 4, it's easy for me to remember because that's how old I am. But I don't need to tell the TACAMO Association or TACAMO Community this because like family, neither has ever forgotten the 16 that perished on that June Day.

What most of the TACAMO Community may not know is that I was only a month old at the time of that tragic event, so I never knew my father personally. For most of my life all I knew of him was that photo that hung on the wall of our house, because my family never really spoke of him as it was hard on my mother. All that changed several years ago when my twin sister Melissa and Cheryl began to speak and the TACAMO association stepped up in an amazing way. The TACAMO Association connected my sister and I with numerous Sailors that served with him and told amazing stories of his quiet demeanor and strength of leadership. They have also told some pretty funny stories of him and others on liberty. Over the years Cheryl, Vern, and the Association have also invited my family to several remembrances, and to tour the VQ3 and VQ4 facilities as well as the TACAMO museum.

The Sailors and the Association may never know the impact they had on my family and mom. The kindness and incredible professionalism of the Navy was on full display during one of these trips. My mother's favorite story to retell was her visit to Tinker Air Force base when she was walking the tarmac and her sandal broke, leaving her shoeless. We boarded an aircraft with a borrowed shoe from my son and continued the tour. The amazing part came when we left the aircraft and a Sailor was standing there with a brand new pair of sandals. She couldn't believe that anyone had taken the time to go shopping and find her new sandals.

All of these events were just the start of changes in my mother's life. Sailors and Navy Families would continue to reach out to my mother and she began to open up about my father. She experienced a lot of emotions in the beginning from anger to sadness. But the constant interaction with the TACAMO Community led her to reconcile the death of my father and give her peace. In the last few years, she told stories of him and we all shared in remembering my father. After 40 years, I now have more of an idea of who he was because of the kindness of this association.

Recently the kindness of the TACAMO association continued when they gave my son, Aubrey Russell III, a scholarship for college. In doing so you have further connected my family to my father and helped us greatly.


I really hope the Sailors, Families and members of the TACAMO Community understand that your efforts have changed the life of my family dramatically. Thank you.

Captain John "Irish" Keilty was honored to serve in the United States Navy as a Pilot for almost 26 years. He has been honored to be a teacher and coach for the last 19 years.

Captain Keilty accumulated over 5000 flight hours in 50 different types of rotary, fixed wing (Carrier based and land based and glider aircraft. He is a qualified parachutist. He was the Commanding Officer of a Navy squadron at Tinker, the Navy Air Wing at Tinker and the U.S. Naval Test Pilot School. Captain Keilty participated in the first Navy Test Pilot Technical Exchange Program just after the Cold War and flew the MIG-29 fighter in Russia. During his tour as Commodare of the Navy Air Wing at Tinker in 1999-2001, his Wing was awarded t Omaha Trophy as the best Air wing in the United States Strategic Command.

After Captain Keilty's naval career he was Athletic Director, Head Baseball Coach Assistant Football Coach and Physics /Math teacher at Mount St. Mary High School in OKC

He was also a summer adjunct Physics and Math teacher at Rose State College. Captain Keilty conducts summer aerospace workshops for middle school kids at Rose State College. Coach Keilty achieved over 200 career victories as Mount St. Mary Baseball Coach from 2004-2017.

Captain Keilty has been awarded the Tinker and the Primes "Patriot Award", the Archdiocese of Oklahoma "Educator of the Year and was recognized by the American Association of Physics Teachers, Oklahomakansas - Kansas Chapter for an Excellence in Physics Education Award. In 2018 Captain Keilty was inducted into the US Navy TACAMIO Hall of Fame.

Presently Captain Keilty is the Senior Navy JROTC instructor at Del City High School. He announces play by play live stream on the Oklahoma Sports Network for all Dei City football games and is the Announcer for basketball and wrestling events. He is on the Del City Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors. Proud to be an eagle!

Military Updates



By TRICARE Communications If you've recently gotten a suspicious text message about your TRICARE coverage, don't respond. Instead, report it to TRICARE.

Some beneficiaries have gotten a text message from 888-763-0248. The sender claims to be Wisconsin Physicians Service, the TRICARE For Life contractor. But the text message is really part of a phishing scam targeting TRICARE For Life beneficiaries. The message says the recipient's TRICARE coverage will expire due to nonpayment. It tells the recipient to call a toll-free number

"The Defense Health Agency has recently learned of this phishing scam," said Anne Breslin, TRICARE For Life program manager at the Defense Health Agency. "While it seems to be aimed at TFL beneficiaries, scammers may try to target anyone who has a TRICARE plan. You should stay aware and report any suspicious messages or calls that say they're from TRICARE."

It's important to know that WPS doesn't collect payments. Also, WPS won't try to contact you via text message.

TRICARE will never text or call you asking for:

- Payment
- Personal identifying information

Keep these tips in mind when it comes to your personal information:

- Never share personal or financial information with someone you don't know.
- Don't open unsolicited, unexpected text messages or emails.
- Don't open links from unknown numbers or emails. Instead, contact your TRICARE contractor using a phone number or website you know is real to verify that they're trying to reach you.

Reporting scams

Have you or someone you know gotten this scam text message? You should report any suspected fraud or abuse related to your TRICARE benefits.

There are two ways to make a report:

- Option 1: Contact your TRICARE contractor.
 - TFL beneficiaries: Contact WPS.
 - Others: Contact the appropriate TRICARE contractor. This may be your regional contractor, the pharmacy contractor, or the Dental Program contractor.
- Option 2: Contact the DHA Office of the Inspector General.
 - Give as much information as possible when you make your report. This may include names, dates, and details. Investigations are confidential. You can choose to remain anonymous.

Protect your personal information. Treat it like a credit card. If someone contacts you by phone, email, or text message asking for this information, don't provide it. Instead, report it to your TRICARE contractor right away.

There are many types of phishing scams targeted toward the military community. For more information, check out Military OneSource.

Preventing TRICARE fraud and abuse is everyone's responsibility. To learn more about how to spot scams, check out the FBI's tips on catching healthcare fraud.

ATTENTION RETIRED MILITARY MEMBERS: Beginning in 2026, the old-style, blue ID cards will no longer be accepted, regardless of the printed expiration date. In order to maintain base access, please visit your nearest DEERS/ ID card office to obtain a new ID. If you're unable to make it to a military installation, you can also request a new card through the RAPIDS ID Card Office Online: https://idco.dmdc.osd.mil/idco/

UPDATE: This policy applies to ID cards of all colors (except the new white ones). They should all be updated in order to maintain base access.
